INCONTRI ISTITUZIONALI DEL MINISTRO URSO A BRUXELLES

Durante una missione di due giorni a Bruxelles, il Ministro delle Imprese e del Made in Italy Adolfo Urso ha incontrato cinque commissari europei, la delegazione italiana di eurodeputati e la vicepresidente esecutiva Teresa Ribera per ribadire le posizioni di Roma sulle riforme dell'UE per l'industria e la competitività. Ha sollecitato **scelte pragmatiche da parte dell'UE che sostengano la competitività**, gestendo al contempo la transizione senza indebolire la base produttiva europea, sostenendo che il 2026 deve portare riforme audaci e attese da tempo, soprattutto per i **settori esposti come quello automobilistico e le industrie ad alta intensità energetica**.

Con Ribera, responsabile della transizione pulita, equa e competitiva, Urso ha sottolineato la leadership italiana nell'acciaio a basse emissioni, chiedendo che le politiche dell'UE riconoscano questo vantaggio e sottolineando la necessità di **garantire la continuità operativa nel rispetto delle norme UE**. Gli altri incontri hanno riguardato la politica di coesione/PNRR con il vicepresidente esecutivo Raffaele Fitto, la strategia industriale e l'accelerazione automobilistica/industriale con il vicepresidente esecutivo Stéphane Séjourné, il digitale/IA e la sovranità tecnologica con il vicepresidente esecutivo Henna Virkkunen, e lo spazio, la sicurezza e le iniziative europee con il commissario Andrius Kubilius.

PUBBLICATO IL LIBRO BIANCO MADE IN ITALY 2030

Il Ministero delle Imprese e Made in Italy ha completato la stesura del **Libro Bianco “Made in Italy 2030”**, documento strategico che definisce la nuova politica industriale italiana fino al 2030, orientando il sistema produttivo con **l’obiettivo di decarbonizzare, modernizzare le filiere e rafforzare l’autonomia economica del Paese**. Il documento è l’esito di un percorso di consultazione pubblica durato oltre un anno che ha coinvolto più di 200 tra associazioni (tra cui AIDAF), imprese e centri di ricerca, a conferma di un impianto partecipato e intersettoriale.

Il documento individua **18 filiere produttive chiave**. Oltre alle tradizionali **“cinque A”** (agroalimentare, abbigliamento, arredo, automazione e automotive), vengono considerate strategiche anche **filieri “abilitanti”** come energia, infrastrutture e costruzioni, digitale e microelettronica, servizi integrati, logistica integrata, siderurgia e metallurgia, chimica e packaging

Inoltre, il Libro Bianco dedica **attenzione all’imprenditoria femminile**, riconosciuta come leva strategica per ampliare la base produttiva e aumentare competitività e innovazione. Le imprese femminili rappresentano circa il 22% del totale e sono particolarmente concentrate nelle grandi aree urbane, con oltre 96.000 realtà nell’area metropolitana di Roma. Il documento evidenzia però criticità strutturali da affrontare: **l’assenza di una definizione univoca di “impresa femminile” a livello UE**, le difficoltà di accesso al credito legate alla minore patrimonializzazione e la prevalenza di microimprese che limita gli investimenti. Per questo vengono indicati interventi prioritari su strumenti finanziari dedicati, formazione tecnico-scientifica (soprattutto STEM), **mentoring** e **misure per favorire il passaggio generazionale alle eredi donne**, insieme a politiche di conciliazione vita-lavoro essenziali per sostenere la crescita dell’imprenditoria guidata da donne.

Il 28 gennaio è stato firmato un Protocollo d'Intesa fra Banca d'Italia e il Ministero dell'Istruzione, finalizzato a **rafforzare la diffusione dell'educazione finanziaria all'interno del sistema scolastico**. L'intesa mira a promuovere una maggiore consapevolezza tra gli studenti riguardo alle opportunità e ai rischi connessi alla gestione delle risorse economiche, favorendo l'acquisizione di competenze utili per orientarsi con maggiore autonomia nelle scelte finanziarie future.

Il Protocollo definisce un quadro di collaborazione volto a valorizzare il ruolo delle istituzioni bancarie nella **trasmissione di conoscenze economiche di base** e a sostenere la crescita di una cultura finanziaria diffusa. L'iniziativa si inserisce nel più ampio obiettivo di incoraggiare la partecipazione attiva delle giovani generazioni alla vita economica e civile, offrendo strumenti formativi che contribuiscano allo sviluppo di responsabilità, consapevolezza e capacità decisionali.

DECRETO LEGGE TRANSIZIONE 5,0 PUBBLICATO IN GAZZETTA UFFICIALE

Il 20 gennaio, il decreto-legge che introduce misure urgenti in materia di investimenti e di produzione di energia da fonti rinnovabili (DL Transizione 5.0) è stato pubblicato in Gazzetta Ufficiale, entrando in vigore il giorno seguente.

Le norme introdotte nel testo base intervengono in materia di **crediti d'imposta del Piano Transizione 5.0**, al fine di incentivare le imprese che investono in beni strumentali che permettano una riduzione dei consumi energetici. Inoltre, si apportano modifiche alle norme relative alle modalità di individuazione delle aree idonee all'installazione di impianti di produzione di energia da fonti rinnovabili.

EFB's Bi-Weekly Update

Below you will find an update of the policy meetings and discussions we can expect over the next couple of weeks.

28th Regime for innovative companies

Background

The European Commission presented the idea of a 28th regime in April 2024, in Former Italian Prime Minister Enrico Letta's report on the single market. It was a recommendation to the European Commission to remove internal barriers within the Single Market via the creation of a harmonised EU level system.

EFB contributed to the call for evidence in September 2025, where we shared suggestions we felt ought to be taken into account by the EU Commission when developing the 28th regime.

Current state of play

On Tuesday 20 January, during the first European Parliament Plenary of 2026, Members of the European Parliament (MEPs) adopted recommendations for the 28th regime for innovative companies.

The recommendations passed with 492 votes in favour, 144 against and 28 abstentions. The recommendations will be included in the European Commission's upcoming proposal which is due to be published before the end of the first quarter of 2026, possibly on 18 March.

The general idea:

- EU countries may either create a new corporate form or incorporate EU-wide rules into an existing one.
- Single set of rules applicable across the EU to allow companies to thrive and expand globally.
- Fully digital Unified European Company (S.EU) with able to be completed in 48 hours, requiring a minimum paid-in capital of only one euro.

EU-Mercosur - update

During the last European Parliamentary plenary session in Strasbourg, MEPs voted to obtain a request from the European Court of Justice in order to assess whether the EU-Mercosur agreement is in line with the EU treaties.

This vote was met with 334 votes in favour, 324 votes against and 11 abstentions, which means that the legal basis for the EU-Mercosur Partnership Agreement will be reviewed by the European Court of Justice.

This move comes after the European Commission signed the agreement on 17 January, 2026 in Paraguay.

Calls for evidence/ Public Consultations

The following initiatives have been published on the European Commission's "Have Your Say" portal for feedback.

Fair labour mobility package

In order to promote and facilitate labour mobility across the EU's Member States and to support the European Labour Authority, to modernise, simplify and digitise social security coordination the EU Commission has launched a call for evidence on the matter. This package is different from the skills portability initiative as the latter seeks to address labour mobility barriers related to skills and qualifications and the former looks more at the social security element.

The aim of the package is to deliver:

- a proposal for a European Social Security Pass,
- a stronger mandate for the European Labour Authority,
- a skills portability initiative.

Deadline for feedback is 2 February, 2026.

Communication on Better Regulation

The aim of this initiative is to make the EU 'better regulation' efforts more efficient and proportionate. The European Commission aims to develop a Communication by the second quarter of 2026. European Social Security Pass

The European Social Security Pass (ESSPASS) is an initiative that aims to simplify how EU citizens moving to or working in other EU countries interact with relevant authorities or service providers in the context of social security. The idea is to develop a Regulation to enable the secure and quick verification of social security rights across borders and simplify procedures for the public, businesses and national authorities via a digital solution.

This initiative will establish a standardised digital solution to streamline processes for citizens, businesses and public authorities.

The Call for evidence is open until 11 February, 2026. The proposal of this Regulation is due in the third quarter of 2026.

Skills Portability Initiative

The European Commission has recently announced calls for evidence and questionnaires on the Skills portability initiative. This initiative is part of the larger Union of skills package. These consultations will feed into both legislative and non-legislative measures by the third quarter of 2026.

According to the European Commission, the idea behind the initiative is to explore how to digitalise diplomas and credentials, improve transparency of skills and qualifications, modernise the recognition processes for regulated professions, simplify procedures for recognising the qualifications and skills of non-EU nationals.

This initiative is a comprehensive package of three interrelated actions all of which have open calls for feedback.

[Action 1: a potential legislative proposal to facilitate worker mobility through improved transparency of skills and qualifications, and digitalisation;](#)

[Action 2: potential measures to facilitate, modernise and expand recognition processes for regulated professions;](#)

[Action 3: a potential legislative proposal for common rules to simplify procedures for the recognition of qualifications and skills of third-country nationals.](#)

EFB will be contributing to these calls for evidence. We encourage you to do the same either directly or by sending us your feedback which we will incorporate into our own.

The deadline is 27 February 2026.
